In 1999, after visiting Bal Mandir orphanage in Kathmandu, we were given the opportunity to sponsor two orphaned sisters, Nari and Chet. The moment we met them, we knew we had become a family. As we readied them to begin at the Reliance School, a private boarding school in Kathmandu, Nari was uneasy. "Dad, I don't want to go," Nari whispered to Bruce. We told her that we knew it was scary, but it was important for both of them to have a proper education for their future. Then Nari suggested something that would change our lives forever: **"Could our friends come with us?"**

The kindness of Nari's idea for her friends to join them helped launch Himalayan Children's Charities, which, to date, has benefited over 2,200 vulnerable Nepali children from severely impoverished backgrounds. Thousands of children in Nepal are denied a future of their own choosing because of economic status, social class or gender. When seeing the number of children in need, it can be painfully daunting - how does one person truly make a difference?

HCC 2017 Highlights

HCC's Earthquake Orphan Scholarship
Program (EOSP) provided life-saving support to
90 children in rural communities, helping to
keep them in school and safe from child labor,
trafficking, and early drop out.

 HCC installed internet service to six remote village schools and a central food kitchen, providing improved educational opportunities for over 2,400 students.

• HCC provided over 5,000 children across rural Nepal with an **anti-trafficking comic book** to raise awareness, combat human trafficking and keep them safe.

All 44 children and youth in our Kathmandu
Signature Program are thriving - excelling in academics, sports and creative endeavors.









• All Signature Program students, who are now 16 or older, are **enrolled in higher education** programs.

• Rupesh graduated from university, bringing the total HCC **university graduates to nine**, with three students now pursing Masters Degrees.



• HCC senior and graduated students successfully registered their very own local NGO, **HCC-Nepal**, which will help develop and implement HCC's scholarship and outreach programs.

HCC Grads Lead Menstrual Hygiene Awareness Project

HCC staff and senior students regularly visited orphanages in Kathmandu and communities in rural Nepal to provide educational seminars on health and hygiene, including on proper menstrual health, and to distribute menstrual hygiene kits and health materials, including toothbrushes, toothpaste, and soap. HCC grads are working to change the conversation about women's health.

HCC Welcomes Higher Education Scholarship Winner Saraswati



In the summer of 2017, HCC welcomed our newest student, Saraswati, as the recipient of the HCC Scholarship for Higher Education. Saraswati is pursuing an education to become a social worker and fulfill her dream of helping communities in need, including her hometown.

2017 Anti-Trafficking Campaign

The rate of child trafficking in Nepal is shocking – UNICEF estimates at least 13,000 Nepali children *each year* are trafficked to India alone. Domestic and international trafficking are both common, and many thousands of children are trafficked each year for labor into hazardous jobs and sexual exploitation.

HCC has partnered with Cause Vision and SASANE to produce and distribute the Nepali language comic book "Chameli Goes to School". With little access to information, many communities and children are unaware of the dangerous risk of human trafficking in their communities. Anti-trafficking comics help close the information gap for those most vulnerable by teaching how to recognize and avoid potential trafficking situations.

Update on Monika

In 2016 HCC staff met young Monika, who had been living on the streets alone since the age of two. In 2017, after the HCC team worked hard to cut through much red tape, Monika joined the HCC family. She is now safe, healthy, living at a local boarding school and is thriving. Currently in lower kindergarten, she is praised by her teachers for her scholastic excellence and warm, kind demeanor- they believe she is a very gifted and has enormous potential.

The WiFi Program - Connecting Rural Schools to the Web

HCC's WiFi Program is working to bring internet services and computer literacy teacher training to remote, underdeveloped communities in rural Nepal. In 2017, with funding from our partners, The Prem Rawat Foundation and the Premsagar Foundation, Nepal, HCC connected computer labs for six schools in the Dhading and Makwanpur districts for 2,400 students and teachers. This project is a game changer for rural schools, providing access to resources for lesson planning, teacher training, and research materials for students and teachers.
